EVENT HIGHLIGHTS

IILM University Holds 20th Convocation, Confers Degrees on 244 MBA Graduates

IILM University, Gurugram, held its 20th Convocation Ceremony on September 13, 2025, conferring degrees upon 244 MBA graduates of the School of Management. The event marked a milestone for the Class of 2025, celebrating academic achievements and inspiring future leaders.

The convocation was highlighted by Dr. Nakul Anand's address, where he urged graduates to embrace innovation with responsibility and purpose. Presided over by Chancellor Prof. Dwarakanath P and Vice Chancellor Prof. Padmakali Banerjee, the event also featured messages of encouragement from Director Dr. Ravi Kumar Jain and Dean Dr. Sunita Dwivedi, inspiring students as they embarked on their professional journeys.

Alongside degree distribution, the university recognized outstanding student performances. Five students received awards for Academic Excellence, while two were honoured with the prestigious Shri Kulwant Rai Gold Medals for academic and overall excellence.

Dr. Asha Saxena Trains IILM Faculty in AI Framework for Enterprise Transformation

IILM University, Gurugram, conducted a three-day AI Factor Faculty Training Program, equipping 86 faculty members with strategies to integrate artificial intelligence into their teaching across disciplines. The training was led by Dr. Asha Saxena, founder of The AI Factor Institute and author of 'The AI Factor'.

The Al Factor is a management framework that equips leaders to drive enterprise-wide transformation through artificial intelligence. At IILM, faculty participated in training sessions that demonstrated how framework could be applied across fields such as business, law, engineering, and healthcare, with a strong focus on responsible effective adoption. The sessions and introduced key components of the framework, including the Power Quadrant, Use Case Prioritization, Readiness, Responsible AI, and the AI Flywheel. These



tools guided participants in assessing organizational readiness, identifying practical use cases, and exploring how AI can reshape business models. The framework enabled faculty to gain both conceptual and useful insights, preparing them to integrate AI into teaching and practice in ways that support innovation, accountability, and long-term institutional growth.

IILM University, AIMS Launch Experiential Learning Lab to Boost MSME Innovation

IILM University, Gurugram, in collaboration with the Association of Indian Management Schools (AIMS) Delhi-Haryana Chapter, recently launched the MSME Experiential Learning Lab to promote innovation and sustainable growth among Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs).

Led by the School of Management, the initiative provides MSMEs with mentorship, live projects, and training in critical areas such as digital transformation, sustainability, and sales, positioning the Lab as a problem-solving hub that converts business challenges into opportunities.

The launch event featured a keynote address by Dr. H.P. Kumar on MSME 2030: Vision for the Future of Small Business, which highlighted digital-first operations, sustainability, and rural enterprise development. A panel discussion on academiaindustry collaboration explored how business schools can partner with MSMEs to drive innovation.



Concluding with a Vote of Thanks by Prof. Saurabh Trivedi, the event underscored the Lab's role in preparing future-ready graduates and empowering MSMEs across India.

Professor Motson Enlightens IILM Students on Business Ownership

On September 16, 2025, IILM University, Gurugram, hosted Professor Nick Motson, Associate Dean of the MSc Programme at City St Georges, University of London, for a session titled "Who Should Own a Company?". Addressing 120 students, he examined ownership models such as family businesses, public corporations, and private equity, linking them to Agency, Stewardship, and Stakeholder theories. Using global examples like Tata, Walmart, Infosys, and Apple, he highlighted their influence on strategy, performance, and stakeholder value.

The interactive Q&A session focused on governance, ethics, and the future of ownership, encouraging students to reflect on broader societal impacts. Concluding, Professor Motson emphasized that no single model is universally superior, as each carries



distinct strengths and challenges. The session aligned with IILM University's mission of fostering critical thinking, global perspectives, and responsible leadership.

Stories, Stress, and Self-discovery: IILM's YourDOST Orientation Inspires Students



IILM University conducted a YourDOST orientation aimed at promoting mental health awareness, self-reflection, and emotional well-being among students.

The session adopted an interactive approach, combining storytelling exercises, discussions, and activities to engage participants in meaningful reflection on personal growth and resilience.

A key activity involved students imagining the title of their autobiography, which facilitated dialogue on themes such as freedom, learning from experiences, and coping with challenges. Examples included titles like "Ja Simran Ja" and "The 20 Chapters", reflecting both humor and introspection. Facilitators emphasized the importance of sharing emotions openly, managing stress, and the role of human connection alongside technological support. An online quiz assessed stress levels, prompting participants to evaluate their coping strategies.

The orientation concluded with students gaining practical strategies to navigate academic pressures and a reinforced sense of community. The initiative demonstrated IILM University's commitment to holistic student well-being.

MILESTONES & MERITS

Dr. Shamik Tiwari named among World's Top 2% Scientists for Third Consecutive Year

Dr. Shamik Tiwari, Dean and Professor at IILM University's School of Computer Science and Engineering, Gurugram, has been named among the world's top 2% scientists for the third consecutive year in the Stanford University–Elsevier global ranking. With over 22 years of experience, he credits this achievement to collaborative efforts with coauthors, students, and institutions.

A pioneer in artificial intelligence and data science, his research spans image processing, neural networks, deep learning, and medical applications such as Alzheimer's detection and cardiovascular disease. He emphasizes preparing students for Al-augmented careers, highlighting the transformative role of automation across industries.

As founding dean, Dr. Tiwari has launched "Vision 2030" to position the school among India's top 100 institutions, partnering with tech



leaders for co-created curricula and real-world projects. He advises aspiring researchers to focus on Attitude, Adaptability, and Agility, encouraging students to embrace technology as Al reshapes every industry.

Dr. Shivani Sharma explores Food, Identity, and Belonging

Dr. Shivani showcased her research at an Oxford conference, using autoethnography to connect personal narrative with broader social inquiry. Through the lens of a school lunchbox,



she explored how colonial legacies and cultural hierarchies shape Indian food habits, educational experiences, and a sense of belonging.

The Oxford setting left a strong impression on Dr. Shivani, with its historic architecture and a culture of thoughtful, respectful dialogue among scholars. Her work resonated internationally, with participants relating to how food traditions can reflect both judgment and belonging.

Encouraged by the reception, Dr. Shivani plans to submit her work to academic journals and continue bridging philosophical inquiry with lived experience. Her presentation highlights IILM University's growing presence on the global academic stage.

CAMPUS FOR A CAUSE

Where Knowledge Became Kindness

IILM University, Greater Noida team's visit to Vaidpura Zila began as an academic field trip but soon became a profound lesson in empathy and community engagement. Initially greeted by a few shy children at the Anganwadi, the team offered chocolates to break the ice, and gradually a larger group gathered. With the support of Anganwadi workers, they conducted small awareness sessions under the trees, discussing disabilities, government entitlements, and the importance of early intervention.

The children's excitement and the parents' candid honesty left a lasting impression on the team. While the children treasured their chocolates, some parents gently highlighted their limited means, offering a sobering perspective.



By the end of the day, the team had shared more than treats, they had fostered trust, understanding, and hope, demonstrating how small acts of kindness can create meaningful, lasting impact.

Saturdays of Change



Every Saturday, IILM University, Greater Noida students visit a government school in partnership with the CRY Foundation, bringing lessons, materials, and a belief in the potential of each child. Beyond academics, their presence nurtures curiosity, confidence, and self-expression.

Joy of Giving

Guided by the belief that true giving involves understanding and sharing in others' daily lives, Professor Apoorva Rao and IILM University, Gurugram students organized a three-day Joy of Giving initiative in collaboration with the Taare Zameen Foundation from September 2 to 4. The project focused on supporting families in Ambedkar Colony, where many residents face daily challenges, particularly in marginalized Scheduled Caste communities.

Students pooled contributions ranging from ₹5 to ₹500 to provide 20 days' worth of essential rations. Rather than handing out cash, they purchased and delivered staples such as wheat, rice, soap, and books, along with small treats for children to bring moments of joy. The team personally visited the community, ensuring transparency and creating a sense of connection and



celebration. Looking ahead, Professor Rao and her team plan community events and a blood donation drive. She emphasizes that their ongoing goal is to foster giving from the heart, cultivating empathy and compassion beyond obligation.

She has also authored studies on PCOS and workplace stress, presented at institutions including IIT Bombay. Known for her confidence, curiosity, and empathy, Simar remains committed to psychology research that makes a meaningful difference in people's lives.

Psychology Students Mark Suicide Prevention Week with Creative Awareness Activity

VOICES IN PRINT

Creative People: Normal or Abnormal?

This question sits at the crossroads of psychology, culture, and personal identity. Creativity is often portrayed as something wild and unpredictable, while normality is associated with stability, routine, and conformity. But are these ideas truly in conflict, or do they overlap in more ways than we assume?

History has long romanticized the idea of the "tortured artist." Figures like Vincent van Gogh, Sylvia Plath, and Virginia Woolf struggled with mental illness, and their pain often seems inseparable from their art. Philosopher Plato described artistic inspiration as a form of "divine madness," suggesting that true creativity requires a break from ordinary thought. But examples like Mozart, J.R.R. Tolkien, and Steven Spielberg challenge this narrative. They were creative without documented mental illness, showing that brilliance does not always require suffering.

Modern research gives us a more balanced view. Some studies show links between creativity and certain mental health conditions, particularly bipolar disorder or schizotypal traits. However, other studies show no strong connection. Many creative people are mentally healthy, and many people with mental illness are not especially creative. What matters more may be emotional depth, resilience, and the ability to reflect on experience.

Creativity can survive and even thrive with proper mental health support. Artists like Yayoi Kusama, Demi Lovato, and others have continued to create while seeking treatment. Passion and obsession with one's craft are common among artists, athletes, scientists, and performers. These qualities do not make someone abnormal; they make them deeply engaged.

So, can you be creative and normal at the same time? The answer is yes. Creativity is not the opposite of normality. It is a part of what it means to be human, and both stability and intensity can exist within the same creative mind.





If you're curious about the unknown or just love a good late-night read, this is a book that I would highly recommend!


