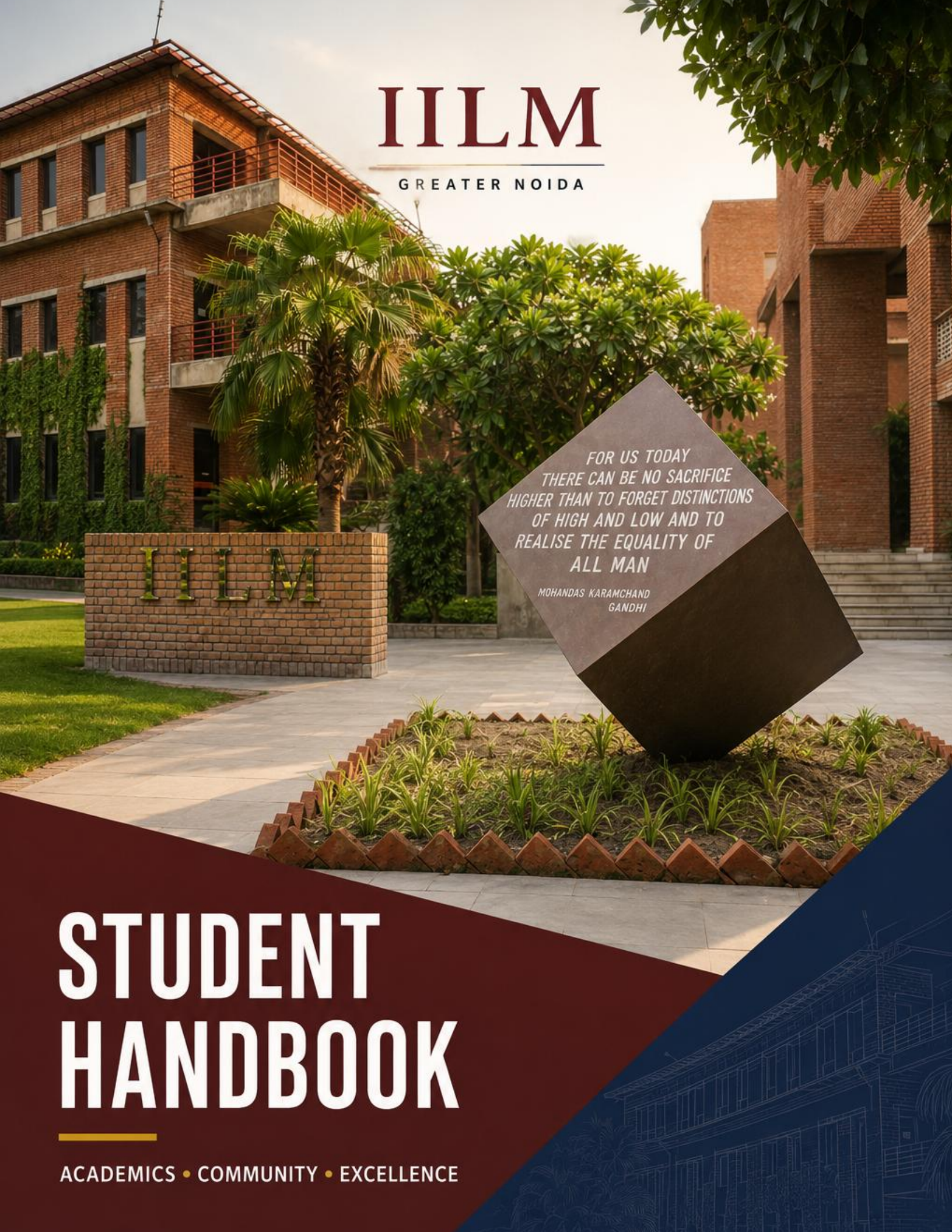

Academic Directory

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2.2 Academic Structure and Framework

IILM University operates on a Choice-Based Credit System (CBCS), aligned with NEP 2020 guidelines. The academic year is divided into two semesters: Odd (July to December) and Even (January to May). Each programme combines core courses, discipline-specific electives and a mandatory practical component to ensure every graduate has real-world professional exposure before completing their degree.

CGPA is calculated as: $CGPA = \frac{\sum (\text{Grade Points} \times \text{Credits})}{\sum \text{Total Credits}}$. A minimum CGPA of 4.0 on a 10-point scale is required for programme completion. Students who fall below 4.0 CGPA are placed on Academic Probation and must appear before the Academic Committee for review.

2.3 Academic Integrity

Academic integrity is not a rule imposed upon students at IILM. It is a value the institution holds as foundational to the very purpose of education. When a student submits work that is not their own, or falsifies data, or seeks an unfair advantage in an assessment, they do not merely violate a policy. They undermine the value of their own degree, disadvantage peers who work honestly and compromise the institutional reputation that makes an IILM qualification worth holding.

Prohibited Conduct

- ▶ Plagiarism in any form or medium, including from published sources, fellow students, online repositories or AI-generated content, without proper attribution
- ▶ Copying during examinations, or providing, receiving or facilitating unauthorised assistance in any assessed work
- ▶ Submitting another person's work as your own, including purchased assignments, ghost-written papers or work completed by any other party
- ▶ Fabricating or falsifying research data, experimental results, citations, sources or any supporting evidence
- ▶ Unauthorised use of AI tools such as ChatGPT or Gemini without explicit faculty permission and disclosure in the submission
- ▶ Collusion on individual assignments not designated as group work
- ▶ Impersonation in any examination, viva voce or assessed presentation

CONSEQUENCES — ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

- ▶ Zero marks in the relevant assessment or examination component
- ▶ Academic probation for the current semester with a formal written warning on record
- ▶ Course suspension, barring the student from continuing or re-registering for the affected course
- ▶ Cancellation of entire semester results for serious or systematic misconduct
- ▶ A permanent notation of misconduct on the academic transcript
- ▶ Permanent dismissal from IILM University for severe or repeated violations
- ▶ Legal action in cases involving impersonation, forgery, fraud or criminal conduct

HOW TO UPHOLD ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

- ▶ Cite every source you use: books, articles, websites, data sets and conversations
- ▶ Start assignments well in advance to avoid time-pressure shortcuts
- ▶ Discuss ideas freely, but always write in your own words
- ▶ Understand the citation format required for each course
- ▶ When uncertain, ask your faculty member before submitting, not after

2.4 Attendance Policy

Regular attendance is a cornerstone of learning at IILM. The university's pedagogy is built around active classroom engagement, discussion, case studies, laboratory work and collaborative learning. These cannot be replicated by reading notes afterward. Consistent attendance also builds the professional habits of punctuality, reliability and engagement that employers value in IILM graduates.

MINIMUM ATTENDANCE REQUIREMENT

- ▶ Students are required to maintain a minimum of 75% attendance. Any relaxation, if applicable, may be considered by the competent authority in accordance with university-approved regulations.
- ▶ Below 75%: Debarred from End Semester Examination in that course
- ▶ Below 65%: Course must be repeated entirely in the next academic cycle
- ▶ Automated parental notification when attendance falls below 75% in any course

2.6 Examination Policy and Administration

The examination process for each semester is administered by the Office of the Controller of Examinations (CoE) in accordance with the syllabus approved by the Board of Studies (BoS). Each course carries assigned credits as per the approved curriculum structure. The Mid-Term and End-Term Examinations for each semester are conducted as per the schedule specified in the Academic Calendar.

To be eligible for the End Semester Examination in any course, students must maintain a minimum attendance of 75% of all scheduled academic sessions, including lectures, tutorials and practicals. Students falling short of the minimum attendance requirement will be assigned an 'X' grade for the respective course(s).

Cases of attendance shortage shall be reviewed by the respective Heads of Department / Dean and forwarded to the Program Office for necessary action.

The weightage distribution between Continuous Assessment, Mid-term and End-term examinations shall be as determined and approved by the Academic Monitoring Committee, and may vary across different types of courses. The minimum period required for completion of a programme shall be the programme duration as specified in the scheme of teaching, learning and examinations and syllabi for the concerned programme.

Maximum Permissible Programme Duration

The maximum permissible period for semester-based programmes is completing a Bachelor's programme. Master's programme for which the prescribed programme duration is 'n' academic years shall be (n + 2) academic years.

Examination Assessment Weightage

- ▶ The weightage distribution between Continuous Assessment, Mid-term and End-term shall be as determined and approved by the Academic Monitoring Committee, and may vary across different types of courses
- ▶ Minimum passing marks in each course component are as specified in the Examination Manual
- ▶ Grade 'X' is awarded for attendance below 75% — student is debarred from the End Semester Examination
- ▶ For the complete and authoritative Examination Policy, refer to the official Examination Manual below

Examination Conduct — Key Rules

- ▶ Students must carry their University ID card to every examination hall; entry without ID card will not be permitted
- ▶ Electronic devices including mobile phones, smart watches and earphones are strictly prohibited inside examination halls
- ▶ Impersonation, use of unfair means, copying or possession of unauthorized material during an examination constitutes academic misconduct and attracts severe penalties including cancellation of the entire semester results
- ▶ Results will be declared as per the schedule published in the Academic Calendar; students must check their results on the Student Portal
- ▶ Re-evaluation and re-checking of answer sheets is available as per the procedure notified by the Controller of Examinations Office
- ▶ Students who are absent from any examination without prior approved leave will be awarded zero marks for that component

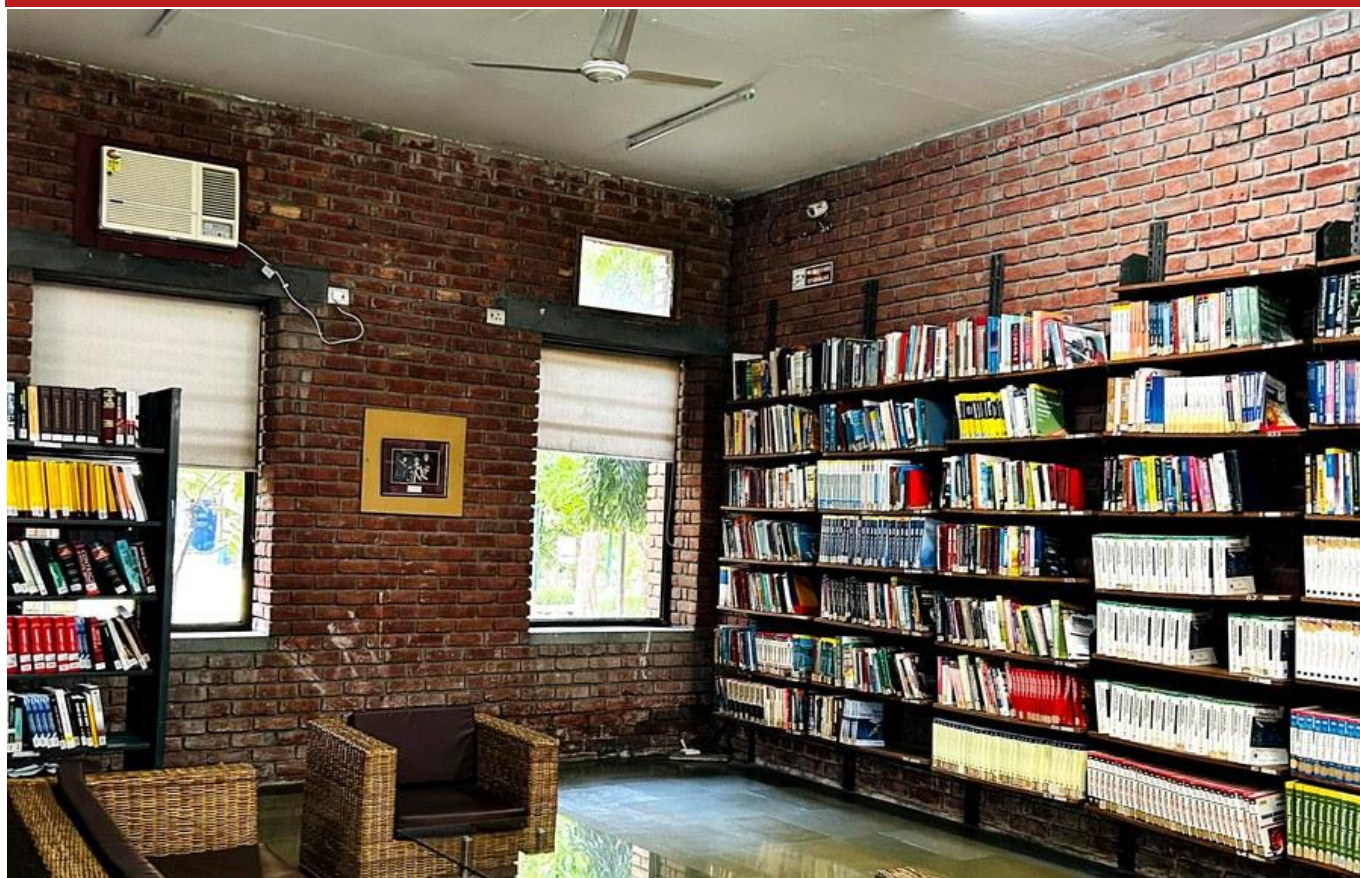

About the Knowledge Resource Centre

The Knowledge Resource Centre (KRC) at IILM University, Greater Noida, is the academic hub fostering access to rich knowledge resources and digital content that support teaching, learning and research across all disciplines. Established in July 2022, the Library operates through two dedicated clusters — one for Engineering and another for Management, Liberal Arts and Law — collectively housing over 67,600 books, electronic resources and subject-specific collections.

Spread across 7,804 sq. ft., the KRC offers a well-equipped infrastructure with Wi-Fi, LAN, barcode systems, printers, scanners and digital access terminals. Seating is available for 145 users across both clusters, supported by a well-ventilated reading environment. Library operations are automated using the Koha Library Management System (LMS) and ERP systems, enabling smooth circulation, cataloguing and reporting through OPAC, barcode systems and online user accounts.

Before leaving the circulation desk, members must check whether the material lent to them is in sound condition; if not, they must immediately report this to the library staff.

Clearance Certificate

All students leaving the institution must obtain a Clearance Certificate from the Librarian to confirm that they have no library dues and have surrendered their membership

IILM University is committed to fostering a safe, inclusive, equitable and student-centred campus environment where every learner is treated with dignity, fairness and respect.

5.1 Students' Grievance Redressal Committee (SGRC)

In accordance with the UGC (Redressal of Grievances of Students) Regulations, 2023, IILM University has constituted the SGRC to provide a formal, transparent and time-bound mechanism for addressing student grievances. The SGRC independently in the adjudication of grievances to ensure impartially, fairness and procedural transparency.

What the SGRC Addresses

- ▶ Non-compliance with the published admission process, fee structure or refund policy
- ▶ Irregularities in examination conduct, paper-setting, result declaration or re-evaluation
- ▶ Denial of benefits, including scholarships, hostel accommodation or library access, to which a student is entitled
- ▶ Failure of the institution to provide services or facilities advertised or committed at the time of admission
- ▶ Harassment, discrimination or unfair treatment by faculty, staff or administration
- ▶ Academic concerns around grading, assessment and evaluation not resolved at department level

How to File a Grievance

- ▶ Step 1: Attempt informal resolution at the department level. Speak directly with the concerned faculty or Head of Department and document the conversation.
- ▶ Step 2: If unresolved within 7 working days, submit a formal written grievance to the SGRC via email or the Student Portal, with a clear description and relevant documentation.
- ▶ Step 3: The SGRC acknowledges your complaint within 48 hours and provides a reference number.
- ▶ Step 4: The SGRC investigates, seeks for evidence from relevant parties and communicates with you throughout.
- ▶ Step 5: Standard grievances resolved within 30 working days; urgent matters within 15 working days.
- ▶ Step 6: The outcome is communicated in writing. If dissatisfied, you may appeal to the Vice Chancellor's office within 15 working days.

Key Functions

- ▶ To ensure equity and equal opportunity to the community at large and promote social inclusion.

- ▶ To create a socially congenial atmosphere for academic interaction and healthy interpersonal relationships among students from diverse social backgrounds.
- ▶ To sensitize the academic community regarding issues of social exclusion and the aspirations of marginalized communities.
- ▶ To assist individuals or groups of students belonging to disadvantaged sections of society in addressing issues related to discrimination.
- ▶ To look into grievances of weaker sections of society and suggest amicable solutions to their problems.
- ▶ To disseminate information regarding welfare schemes, programmes, notifications, memoranda, and government orders issued from time to time.
- ▶ To develop barrier-free procedures for admission and registration of students belonging to disadvantaged groups.
- ▶ To coordinate with government bodies and other organizations to mobilize academic and financial resources for disadvantaged students.
- ▶ To organize periodic meetings to monitor the progress of various schemes and initiatives.
- ▶ To ensure adequate representation of SC/ST communities in admissions and recruitment processes and improve their performance.
- ▶ To sensitize the University community to the concerns and challenges faced by SC/ST and other disadvantaged groups.

5.3 Socio-Economically Disadvantaged Groups Cell (SEDGs)

IILM University is committed to ensuring that every student has equitable access to quality education and the opportunity to realise their academic potential. The Social and Economic Support Policy is the institutional commitment that backs this position with concrete mechanisms.

- ▶ To protect all the constitutional rights of the SEDGs students.
- ▶ To ensure that the HEIs are inclusive, safe, and secure for the SEDGs students.
- ▶ To provide socio-emotional and academic support and mentoring for the students belonging to the SEDGs through proper counselling and monitoring programmes.
- ▶ To facilitate proper implementation and monitoring of orientation and bridge courses designed by the HEIs to benefit SEDGs students.
- ▶ To monitor implementation of all programmes designed and developed by HEIs to increase the participation of SEDGs students in academic activities.

- ▶ To strengthen implementation of Government policies, including reservation policies and various schemes, programmes, facilities, and guidelines for SEDGs students.
- ▶ To promote that the HEIs develop appropriate outreach programmes to help SEDGs students avail themselves of various educational and academic opportunities.
- ▶ To ensure proper implementation of preventive measures and laws against discrimination and atrocities, and to safeguard students belonging to respective SEDG categories.
- ▶ To circulate, publicize, facilitate, and monitor the implementation of all UGC and Government guidelines and instructions issued from time to time regarding SEDGs.
- ▶ To redress grievances and complaints of SEDGs students within 15 days through the Grievance Redressal Committee (GRC) without compromising the safety, privacy, and dignity of the complainant.

5.4 Anti-Ragging Cell

Ragging in any form is a criminal offence under Indian law. IILM University enforces a zero-tolerance policy, not merely because the law mandates it, but because student dignity & safety are fundamental institutional values. The university fully implements all directives of the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India, the UGC and the Government of India on the prevention, prohibition and punishment of ragging in higher educational institutions.

Understanding Ragging

Ragging includes any act, whether physical, verbal, psychological, online/digital or otherwise, that:

- ▶ Causes or is likely to cause physical or psychological harm, apprehension, fear, shame or embarrassment to any student at any time
- ▶ Involves teasing, abusing, physically assaulting, playing practical jokes on or causing hurt to any student
- ▶ Coerces a student to perform any act they would not voluntarily choose to do
- ▶ Takes the form of bullying, harassment, hazing or any initiation ritual, regardless of whether the target appears to consent
- ▶ Targets any student on grounds of colour, race, religion, caste, ethnicity, gender identity, sexual orientation, nationality, region, language or economic background

Mandatory Anti-Ragging Affidavit

All enrolled students must file an Anti-Ragging Affidavit on the national portal before each academic year. Non-compliance results in ineligibility for examination registration and hostel accommodation.

Penalties for Ragging

Penalties are severe and applied without exception, and may include any or all of the following:

- ▶ Immediate suspension from all academic activities
- ▶ Cancellation of the semester's academic registration and results
- ▶ Withholding of scholarships, awards and all institutional benefits
- ▶ Hostel expulsion with no entitlement to refund of paid fees
- ▶ Rustication or permanent expulsion from IILM University
- ▶ Filing of an FIR with local police; a criminal case will be registered without exception

5.5 Internal Complaints Committee

The Internal Complaints Committee (ICC), also known as the Gender Committee, is constituted at IILM University under the Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 and UGC Regulations, 2015. The ICC operates as a fully independent body empowered to receive, investigate and adjudicate complaints of sexual harassment from any member of the campus community.

What Constitutes Sexual Harassment

- ▶ Physical contact and advances of a sexual nature, including any unwanted physical contact
- ▶ Demand or request for sexual favours, whether explicit or implied, including in the context of a power relationship
- ▶ Sexually coloured remarks, sexual jokes, display of pornographic material or obscene gestures
- ▶ Creating a hostile, intimidating or offensive environment through conduct of a sexual nature
- ▶ Any conduct of a sexual nature communicated verbally, non-verbally, in writing or through digital platforms including messages, images or social media posts

Filing a Complaint

- ▶ Submit a written complaint to the ICC Chairperson at icc@iilm.edu within 3 months of the incident; exceptional circumstances may allow for later complaints
- ▶ The ICC acknowledges receipt within 7 working days and initiates the inquiry
- ▶ The inquiry must be completed within 60 days of receiving the complaint
- ▶ Both the complainant and respondent have the right to present their case and produce witnesses
- ▶ The identities of both parties are kept confidential in accordance with applicable law.

5.6 Disciplinary Committee

The Disciplinary Committee at IILM University is the formal institutional body responsible for maintaining academic and behavioural standards across the university. It reviews all cases of misconduct referred to it, ensures due process and natural justice, and recommends proportionate penalties. The Committee acts as the second tier of the disciplinary process — above the School-level resolution but below the Vice Chancellor's office.

Functions and Powers

- ▶ Receive, review and adjudicate disciplinary cases referred by School Deans, Wardens, the Anti-Ragging Committee or the Office of Student Affairs
- ▶ Conduct formal enquiries including hearings where the student has the right to present their side
- ▶ Review evidence, witness statements, CCTV footage recordings and any other relevant material
- ▶ Recommend penalties including written warning, suspension, fine, hostel expulsion or rustication
- ▶ In cases of severe misconduct, refer the matter with recommendations to the Vice Chancellor
- ▶ Maintain a confidential disciplinary record for each case reviewed and its outcome
- ▶ Ensure all proceedings follow the principles of natural justice — every student is provided an opportunity to be heard.
- ▶ Review appeals from students against School-level disciplinary decisions

The Disciplinary Process

Stage	What Happens
Stage 1: Incident Report	An incident is reported to the School Dean, Warden or Office of Student Affairs by a student, faculty or staff member
Stage 2: Preliminary Review	The reporting authority reviews the incident and determines whether a formal disciplinary referral is required
Stage 3: Committee Referral	If the matter is serious, it is referred to the Disciplinary Committee with a written report and any evidence
Stage 4: Show Cause Notice	The student receives a written Show Cause Notice specifying the allegations and is given 7 days to respond
Stage 5: Hearing	The Committee conducts a hearing where the student may present their defence and call witnesses
Stage 6: Decision	The Committee issues a reasoned written decision with the penalty, if any
Stage 7: Appeal	The student may appeal the Committee's decision to the Vice Chancellor within 15 days of receiving it

5.7 Student Code of Conduct

The Student Code of Conduct is one of the most important documents governing life at IILM University. It applies to every enrolled student in any programme, including exchange and visiting students, and governs behaviour in academic spaces, residential facilities, online platforms and at any university-associated event, whether held on or off campus. This Code reflects not just institutional requirements but the character we expect every IILM student to embody.

A. Academic Conduct and Integrity

Academic conduct goes to the heart of what a university is. Every student is expected to:

- ▶ Submit only original, independently produced work in all assessments unless group work is explicitly designated by the course faculty member
- ▶ Acknowledge all sources used in academic work through proper citation in the format specified by the faculty
- ▶ Refrain from all forms of plagiarism, including copying from sources without attribution, paraphrasing without acknowledgment, and purchasing or obtaining assignments from any third party
- ▶ Do not use AI tools to generate academic work except where expressly permitted by faculty. Any approved use of AI must be appropriately acknowledged in the submitted work.
- ▶ Maintain honesty and integrity in all examinations, viva voce, presentations and assessments
- ▶ Not impersonate another student in any academic context and not allow another person to impersonate oneself
- ▶ Report observed instances of academic misconduct through appropriate channels, understanding that silence in the face of misconduct is itself a form of complicity

B. Classroom and Academic Space Conduct

- ▶ Attend all scheduled classes, tutorials and laboratory sessions punctually; habitual lateness is disrespectful to faculty and fellow students

- ▶ Switch all mobile phones to silent mode before entering any classroom, examination hall or academic space; calls and messaging during class are strictly prohibited
- ▶ Engage actively and respectfully in all academic discussions; every student's perspective deserves to be heard with courtesy
- ▶ Refrain from disruptive behaviour including side conversations, sleeping during class-sessions, use of earphones or any conduct that disrupts the learning environment
- ▶ Follow faculty instructions regarding the use of laptops, tablets and other devices in the classroom; these are academic tools and must be used as such
- ▶ Maintain the cleanliness and orderliness of classrooms, laboratories and all academic spaces; leave every space in the condition in which you found it

C. Social Conduct and Community Standards

- ▶ Treat every member of the campus community — students, faculty, staff, security personnel, housekeeping staff and visitors — with dignity, courtesy and respect at all times
- ▶ Refrain from any language, gesture, action or communication that is abusive, offensive, discriminatory, sexually suggestive or intended to intimidate or demean any individual
- ▶ Respect and value the diversity of the IILM community; discrimination on the basis of caste, religion, gender identity, sexual orientation, physical ability, regional background, economic status or any other characteristic is a serious violation of the Code
- ▶ Maintain professional standards of dress and appearance appropriate to the university environment; follow any dress code guidelines specified by the School or for specific events
- ▶ Conduct yourself as a representative of IILM University in all external settings, whether at inter-university competitions, industry visits, internships or any public forum; your conduct reflects on the institution
- ▶ Be mindful and considerate in communal living spaces including dining halls, common rooms, libraries and hostels; noise, littering and inconsiderate behaviour are not acceptable

D. Digital and Social Media Conduct

The digital footprint of every student is a permanent record of their character and judgment. IILM University expects the highest standards of digital conduct from its students, both on university systems and on personal platforms.

- ▶ Use university IT infrastructure, software, email and internet connectivity only for academic, professional and legitimate purposes
- ▶ Students are expected to use the University's Wi-Fi and IT resources responsibly and ethically. Accessing or transmitting obscene, pornographic, offensive, illegal, or inappropriate content using the University's network is strictly prohibited. Any violation of this policy will be treated as a serious disciplinary matter and may result in appropriate action under the University's Code of Conduct.
- ▶ Protect your university login credentials (NetID, student portal password); sharing credentials with any other person is prohibited
- ▶ Do not access, tamper with or attempt to compromise any university system, database, examination record or student information system
- ▶ Use social media responsibly; students must not post content that defames, harasses, sexually targets, impersonates or spreads false information about any member of the university community

- ▶ Cyberbullying — including targeted harassment, trolling, sharing of private images or coordinated intimidation campaigns on any platform — is treated as seriously as physical bullying and attracts the same disciplinary consequences
- ▶ Do not misrepresent your IILM affiliation or the university's positions, policies or achievements on any public or social platform
- ▶ If you encounter a data breach, cybersecurity vulnerability or misuse of university IT systems, report it immediately to itsupport.gn@iilm.edu

E. Campus Property and Resources

- ▶ Take care of all university property including furniture, equipment, laboratory instruments, library materials, sports equipment and hostel fixtures
- ▶ Report any damage to university property to the relevant department immediately; attempting to conceal damage is itself a disciplinary offence
- ▶ Do not remove, relocate or borrow university equipment without authorised permission
- ▶ Use common facilities — printers, computer labs, sports equipment, pantry appliances — with consideration for other users and return all borrowed items promptly
- ▶ Do not bring food or beverages into areas where this is prohibited (examination halls, computer labs, library)
- ▶ Save energy and water; switch off lights, fans and air conditioning when leaving any room

F. Guest and External Conduct

- ▶ Treat all guests, visitors, external speakers and recruits visiting the campus with the highest standard of courtesy and professionalism
- ▶ When representing IILM in external competitions, conferences, industry visits or cultural events, conduct yourself with integrity and sportsmanship
- ▶ At IILM-hosted events, act as a host — welcoming, helpful and considerate to participants from other institutions
- ▶ Do not invite external individuals to restricted areas of campus or hostel without proper authorisation
- ▶ When participating in any social media coverage of external events involving IILM, ensure that your posts reflect positively and accurately on the institution

G. Consequences and Disciplinary Process

Violations of the Student Code of Conduct are addressed through a fair and transparent disciplinary process. The severity of the consequence is proportional to the nature of the violation, the degree of harm caused and the student's disciplinary history.

Tier	Nature of Violation	Typical Consequences
Tier 1 — Minor	First-time minor offences, low-impact violations	Verbal warning, written warning, community service, formal apology
Tier 2 — Moderate	Repeated minor offences, moderate violations with some harm	Written warning on record, parent notification, financial penalty, probation
Tier 3 — Serious	Significant violations, harm to others, dishonesty	Suspension from academic activities, hostel expulsion, grade penalty

Tier 4 — Severe	Zero Tolerance offences, serious harm, criminal conduct	Permanent expulsion, academic result cancellation, police complaint (FIR)
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Every student against whom disciplinary action is proposed has the right to be heard, to present their perspective and to appeal a decision through the formal appeals process detailed in the Disciplinary Policy available on the Student Portal.

5.8 Student ID Card

The Student ID Card is an official university document that establishes a student's identity and establishment to university services and privileges. It serves as a proof of enrolment and meant to be carried while on campus for entry to the library, examination halls, hostels and all university facilities. Loss of an ID card must be reported immediately, as misuse by another person may compromise campus security and student identity.

ID CARD — IMPORTANT RULES

- ▶ Your Student ID Card must be carried at all times on campus and must be produced on demand to any authorized university personnel or security staff
- ▶ Loss of ID card must be reported immediately to the Program Office and Campus Security
- ▶ Misuse of an ID card — including lending it to another person, using someone else's card or tampering with it in any way — is a serious disciplinary offence
- ▶ Students must surrender their physical ID card to the Program Office upon graduating or withdrawal from the university
- ▶ Use of a lost or stolen ID card for unauthorized campus access or any other purpose will attract disciplinary action and may result in legal consequences

Process for Applying for a Duplicate ID Card

If your ID card is lost, damaged or stolen, you must apply for a duplicate through the Program Office of your School. The following steps apply:

- ▶ Step 1: Submit a written application to your Program Office reporting the loss or damage of your ID card
- ▶ Step 2: The Program Office will review the request and forward it for approval
- ▶ Step 3: Upon approval, the student must pay ₹200/- for the duplicate ID card. The approval is not automatic and repeat offenders may face additional disciplinary action
- ▶ Step 4: After payment confirmation, the Program Office will prepare the new ID card. When ready, the student will be notified by email to collect the card from the Program Office

Temporary ID Card

In case of an emergency where you urgently need an ID card (for an examination, event or access), a temporary ID can be issued by the Programme Office for a limited period while the duplicate is being processed.

A temporary ID is valid for 48 hours only and must be replaced by the permanent duplicate. Print and paste a passport-sized photograph and get it attested by the Programme Office for official use.

5.9 Fee Policy and Guidelines

All fee-related matters are governed by the Fee Policy approved by the Academic Council and Board of Management. Students and families are encouraged to review this policy in full at admission and at the start of each academic year.

- ▶ All fees are due on the specified dates notified at the start of each semester; late payment attracts a fine of ₹100/- per day
- ▶ Students with fee arrears will not be permitted to appear in End Semester Examinations or receive official academic documents
- ▶ Scholarships, waivers and financial assistance are credited to the student's fee account before the semester due date
- ▶ Electronic payment receipts are generated immediately and available on the Student Portal
- ▶ Hostel fees are payable separately and due before hostel check-in each semester

Refund Policy

Fee refunds are governed by the UGC (Refund of Fees) Regulations and the university's published Fee Refund Policy. In cases of withdrawal, refund entitlements are calculated based on time elapsed between payment and the date of formal withdrawal, per UGC-prescribed time-based slabs. No refund is admissible after the last date of admission as notified.

Held annually in February on the IILM campus, MOSAIC is the single largest student-organised cultural festival in the Greater Noida University belt, and one of the most anticipated events in the Delhi-NCR student calendar.

MOSAIC 2025 — A New High-Water Mark

Mosaic 2025 was a breathtaking three-day extravaganza of creativity, culture and competitive excellence that redefined what a university cultural festival can be. With 50+ universities sending their finest talent and 500+ students competing across 24 meticulously curated events, Mosaic 2025 was the most expansive, most vibrant and most electrifying edition in IILM's history.

The festival transformed the IILM campus into a luminous stage where art, music, theatre, literature, dance, fashion and spoken word converged in a single spectacular celebration. For three days, the boundaries between university and arena dissolved — and IILM established itself, definitively, as one of the most dynamic and creatively alive institutions in the National Capital Region.

What Happens at MOSAIC

MOSAIC spans three full days and encompasses 24 events across every domain of creative expression. Competition categories include:

Performing Arts

Classical and Western dance battles, group choreography, solo singing, band performances, orchestra, open-mic poetry and spoken word, standup comedy and nukkad natak street theatre.

Visual Arts & Design

On-the-spot painting, photography contests, digital art, fashion design, rangoli and mehendi — judged by industry professionals from the creative sector.

Literary & Debate

Ad-Mad Show, creative writing, slam poetry, elocution, debate, quiz competitions and the campus-wide editorial challenge — all in a single intense weekend.

Fashion & Lifestyle

Mr. & Ms. MOSAIC — the most-awaited event of the festival. Cascade (fashion show), Western attire competition, and Traditional Day showcase the full spectrum of personal expression.

Tech & Innovation

Web design sprint, app development challenge and the Innovation Pitchathon — because at IILM, creative excellence and technical ambition coexist on the same stage.

Deeksharambh — The Grand Welcome of New Students

Every academic year at IILM begins not with a lecture, but with a celebration. Deeksharambh — meaning ‘the commencement of learning’ — is IILM University’s grand orientation and freshers’ welcome programme, designed to ease the transition of new students into university life and to forge the bonds of community that will define the next three or four years of their lives.

Spread across the first two weeks of the academic session, Deeksharambh is a carefully structured sequence of experiences: academic orientations by each School, campus tours, an introduction to the student welfare ecosystem, interactive sessions with faculty and seniors, and the centrepiece event — the Freshers’ Night, when new students are welcomed by their seniors in a celebration of music, dance, comedy, and the kind of laughter that only a shared beginning can produce.

The Department of Students' Welfare (DSW) is IILM University's primary student-facing administrative body. Headed by Dean Students' Welfare Dr. Arvind Kumar Jain, the DSW operates from one guiding conviction: an institution's most important measure of success is not the prestige of its rankings or the scale of its facilities — but the extent to which every student within it feels supported, respected and genuinely cared for. The DSW is the first port of call for all non-academic student concerns, from hostel grievances to financial hardship, from club approvals to disciplinary proceedings.

It is a proactive, year-round commitment built on personal engagement, institutional accountability and a genuine belief that a student who feels safe, heard and supported will learn better, grow faster and contribute more meaningfully — to the campus, and to the world beyond it.

Internships are a mandatory component of all undergraduate and postgraduate programmes at IILM University. They are designed to bridge the gap between academic learning and professional application, giving students real-world exposure before their final placement

Summer Internship — MBA Students

All MBA students complete a 10-week corporate internship as a mandatory academic requirement. The Placement Cell facilitates company allocation, the student signs an NDA if required, submits a project report on return and presents findings to a faculty panel in the odd semester.

How Campus Recruitment Works

The campus recruitment process at IILM follows a transparent, student-friendly process designed to give every eligible student fair access to all opportunities

Step 1

Register on the Placement Portal

Final-year students register to the IILM Placement department, upload their resume, and fill in their academic and co-curricular profile.

Step 2	Pre-Placement Talks (PPTs) Companies visit campus (in-person or online) to present their company, roles on offer and selection criteria. Students are encouraged to attend all PPTs to make informed choices.
Step 3	Apply for Drives Students apply individually for companies they are interested in. Eligibility criteria (CGPA, no backlogs) are verified by the Placement Cell before the application is forwarded to the company.
Step 4	Selection Process Companies conduct their selection process on campus: aptitude tests, group discussions, technical rounds and HR interviews. The Placement Cell coordinates all logistics and ensures a smooth process.
Step 5	Offer and Acceptance Shortlisted candidates receive offer letters. Students must accept or decline within the stipulated time. IILM follows a 1-offer-policy: once a student accepts an offer, they are removed from further drives at the same level.
Step 6	Joining and Handover The Placement Cell maintains records of all offers, joining dates and CTC details. Students must inform the Placement Cell of their joining status and any offer withdrawal to protect the institution's credibility with recruiters.

7.3 Innovation Foundation (IILMIF)

IILM University continued to strengthen its entrepreneurial ecosystem through the IILM Innovation Lab during 2025–26. Established in 2024, the Innovation Lab has emerged as a vibrant hub for start-up incubation, innovation-driven learning, industry collaboration, and entrepreneurship development.

The incubation ecosystem currently supports **28** start-up incubates across diverse sectors. Several start-ups associated with the ecosystem demonstrated notable achievements during the year. **Xpedicr Industry Pvt. Ltd.** emerged as a recognized Start-up India and MSME registered start-up actively contributing to the HealthTech and

innovation ecosystem, while **DefendAir Technologies Pvt. Ltd.** gained recognition as a funded technology start-up working on innovation-driven solutions. Another associated start-up, **GN Growsew**, achieved an impressive revenue growth of approximately **₹2.75 Crore**, highlighting the growing impact and scalability of start-ups nurtured within the IILM innovation ecosystem.

8.3 Faculty Mentorship Programme

Every student is assigned a dedicated Faculty Mentor from the commencement of their programme. The mentorship relationship is a genuine human connection between a student and an experienced academic professional invested in their success. Mentors meet with their mentees at least once a month, with meetings documented in the Mentorship Register reviewed by the Dean of Academics each semester.

- ▶ Academic planning and semester goal-setting support
- ▶ Career guidance, internship advice and connections to industry through the faculty member's professional network
- ▶ Professional mental health counselling is handled by certified counsellors
- ▶ Advocacy for the student at faculty meetings and in academic processes
- ▶ Industry mentor connections for PG students through the Placement Cell
- ▶ Faculty mentors provide academic and pastoral guidance

8.4 Health Services

The IILM campus health centre provides primary medical care, first-aid and emergency response to all enrolled students. Students with pre-existing conditions are strongly encouraged to register them with the Health Centre at admission so that appropriate care can be provided promptly in any emergency.

CHAPTER 09

HOUSING AND ACCOMMODATION

Safe, comfortable and community-driven living

IILM University provides residential hostel facilities on the Knowledge Park II campus for students who choose to live in university accommodation. For those who stay on campus, the hostel is more than a place to sleep — it is a community. The choices made there, the relationships built and the habits formed will shape the university experience as profoundly as anything that happens in a lecture hall.

9.1 Hostel Facilities

9.2 Rooms Allocation and Reassignment

A. Room Allocation

Room allotment at the hostel is made on a twin-sharing or three-sharing basis for the entire academic year, as approved by the university.

- ▶ Roommates are decided by the University with the help of relevant information provided by students at the time of admission
- ▶ All students are expected to room with students from within their own batch

B. Room Changes

Changing rooms in the middle of the session or without formal authorisation from the university may not be possible. This is to ensure the university database remains intact for emergency situations.

C. Room Reassignment

Residents may request a room change due to unlivable non-functioning facilities or other infrastructure issues. The concerned student should meet with their Warden for assistance. If the request is deemed valid, the Warden, in consultation with senior members of the Office of Student Affairs, may recommend a room change.

D. Room Keys

Students will be issued keys to their allotted room, including keys for the wardrobe and desk drawers, at the beginning of the academic year. They are responsible for keeping their keys safe. The University is not liable for losses or damages sustained to personal belongings because a student lent their keys to another individual.

- ▶ Duplication of keys and/or use of duplicate keys for unauthorised access is a punishable offence and will be reported to the concerned committee
- ▶ If a key is lost, a replacement may be issued by the Warden subject to availability. All costs incurred for replacement keys must be borne by the student

E. Roommate Conflict Resolution

In case a student is experiencing roommate conflict, the following steps should be followed:

- ▶ Step 1: The student should first attempt to improve their living situation by carefully and responsibly communicating with their roommate about the difficulties faced
- ▶ Step 2: If communication does not lead to positive outcomes, the student may go to their Warden to seek assistance. Wardens are trained and will arrange a mediation process to best resolve conflicts
- ▶ Step 3: If the problem persists, the Warden will refer the matter to the Office of Student Affairs for further action. After reviewing the request, a room or roommate change based on availability can be facilitated

Note: Any roommate change made outside this process will not be considered official.

F. Room Clearance and End-of-Year Procedures

While the allotted room will be retained by resident students at the end of the Monsoon (Odd) Semester, rooms must be completely vacated at the end of the respective academic year or programme, with the Room and Keys form duly filled and handed over to the respective Warden. At the end of the Monsoon Semester, luggage will be moved to the cloakroom for safekeeping and tags will be assigned to students to claim their luggage upon their return.

9.3 Living Protocols

A. Room Condition and Checklist Form

- ▶ At the beginning of room allotment, submitting a Room Checklist Form is crucial. This form gives students an opportunity to declare the condition of their room and contents upon moving in and reduces the possibility of being charged for a pre-existing condition.
- ▶ If a resident fails to complete and submit this form, their room will be assumed to be in good condition, free of damages, and complete with all contents.

B. Prohibited Electrical Appliances

- ▶ Using personal electrical appliances such as kettles, coffee makers, induction/hot plates, microwaves, mini-fridges, refrigerators, irons, heaters and immersion rods inside rooms is strictly prohibited. This is to ensure the safety of students from fire hazards. Students may avail common pantry facilities available in each hostel block.

C. Room Maintenance Standards

- ▶ Students are responsible for keeping their rooms in good order throughout their residency
- ▶ It is prohibited to alter any campus property, including removing furniture from the room
- ▶ Painting, applying decals, or cosmetically altering furnishings is not permitted

- ▶ Defacing walls, doors and common areas with write-ups, sketches or drawings is strictly prohibited
- ▶ Installation of personal property including nailing fixtures to walls or ceilings and drilling holes is not permitted

D. Common Areas

Common areas are meant to serve as a space for all residents to come together and avail common resources. Monopolising the area is strictly discouraged.

Upon any damage or loss to university property in common areas and rooms, three times the cost of repair or replacement will be billed to the student(s) found responsible.

9.4 Entry/Exit Procedures

Evening's Grace, Quiet Space

- ▶ Quiet Hours in hostels are to be observed between 10:00 PM and 7:00 AM every day.
- ▶ During Quiet Hours, students must refrain from playing music or creating loud noise in rooms, common rooms, washrooms or corridors.
- ▶ Even outside Quiet Hours, students are expected not to cause disturbance to other members of the community.

Entry and Exit Procedure

- ▶ Main Gate: Student entry and exit from campus is registered and enabled through biometric systems at the Gate. If the system is down, students must make a manual entry in the register provided.
- ▶ Hostel students are expected to return to hostels by 8:00 PM. Failure to comply will lead to disciplinary action and intimation to parents/guardians.
- ▶ Special approvals for late entry or exit must be obtained from the parent/guardian of all UG students and the Office of Student Affairs, with stated reasons and supporting documents.
- ▶ Requests for one-to-two-hour departures during midnight for birthdays or celebrations cannot be accommodated.
- ▶ Students must cooperate with the Security Team. Authorised personnel may deny permission to students found in violation of the Code of Conduct.
- ▶ The University reserves all rights to regulate student movement in and out of campus keeping the safety and security of the community in mind.

9.5 Visitor Guidelines

To ensure privacy for all students, visitors do not have access to hostel rooms. They are allowed to visit students on campus or at the entrance of the hostel between 8:00 AM and 5:00 PM.

- ▶ Parents/Guardians are permitted to access their ward's room during moving-in at Orientation and moving out at end of programme (and on occasions of medical emergencies with prior Warden approval). Meetings in common rooms are permitted; only female guardians in girls' hostel, only male guardians in boys' hostel.
- ▶ Staff/Faculty must carry their University ID Card and sign in at the front desk; entry inside rooms is permitted only after special approval from the Administration of the University.

9.6 Room Inspections

The hostel authorities may inspect a student's allotted room without prior consent or notification under circumstances indicating danger to the well-being of an individual or a violation of University regulations. An inspection involves opening all locked and closed spaces by the authorised personnel to seek evidence for the reported violation.

Authorised Inspection Personnel

- ▶ Warden / Senior Warden
- ▶ Hostel Manager
- ▶ Staff from the Office of Student Welfare

Inspection Procedure

- ▶ A formal inspection permit will be issued by the Department of Students' Welfare or University Administration.
- ▶ The inspection team will attempt to secure permission for entry by knocking; a two-minute time-lapse is provided for residents to open the door. If the door is not opened within two minutes, the inspecting officer may enter without permission
- ▶ The team will try to conduct the inspection in the presence of the occupants wherever possible
- ▶ Any student who believes inspection procedures have been violated may appeal to the Vice Chancellor of the University.

9.7 Resident Rights

As a stressful living environment can affect a student's academic performance and emotional well-being, IILM University is committed to ensuring that the following basic rights are binding upon all students:

- a. The right to privacy
- b. The right to free and uninhibited access to the allotted room at all times
- c. The right to have the roommate and/or peers respect personal belongings
- d. The right to study and sleep peacefully in the allotted room, free from undue interference from the roommate and/or peers
- e. The right to be asked and to grant or deny permission for having peers invited over to the allotted room
- f. The right to free and uninhibited access to common spaces
- g. The right to be treated as equal without fear of harassment, intimidation, bullying, or physical and/or emotional harm.
- h. The right to discuss and resolve disagreements in a respectful and open manner

9.8 Prohibition of possession, Use and abuse of Substances

The sale, distribution, manufacture and use of alcohol, tobacco and/or other controlled substances is strictly prohibited on university premises. If a student is found consuming any of the aforementioned materials and/or is in possession of alcohol or narcotic drugs, they will be reported to concerned authorities. Strict disciplinary action will be taken against those behaving in a disorderly manner after consuming any of the aforementioned items.

To maintain a hazard-free environment, students are forbidden from possessing the following items for recreational or decorative purposes:

- ▶ Alcohol bottles
- ▶ Hookah, bong, chillums or water pipes

- ▶ Drug manufacture paraphernalia of any kind

The hostel authorities reserve the right to conduct inspections of student rooms to maintain a substance-free environment on campus.

CHAPTER 10

SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

Global citizens. Responsible actors. Positive change-makers.

One of IILM's three defining values are RESPONSIBILITY — and this value finds its fullest expression not in policy documents or mission statements, but in the actions of IILM students in their communities. The university's social responsibility programme is a sustained institutional commitment to ensuring that every IILM graduate leaves not just better equipped to pursue their own success, but genuinely motivated and capable of contributing to the world around them.

Social responsibility at IILM is not a one-off activity or a box to be ticked. It is embedded in the university calendar, in the curriculum and in the culture of the institution. Through the National Service Scheme, the Swachh Bharat Mission, the Nasha Mukta Bharat Abhiyan, environmental sustainability drives, blood donation camps and digital literacy initiatives, IILM students engage with real communities, face real challenges and develop the qualities of empathy, leadership and civic responsibility that define the university's graduates.

- ▶ Nasha Mukta Bharat Abhiyan — Substance abuse awareness in formal partnership with Ministry of Social Justice and Empowerment
- ▶ Tree Plantation Drives — Semester-wide green campus initiatives with faculty and student participation; net-zero waste target
- ▶ Community Outreach — Education support, health camps and livelihood assistance for underserved communities near the campus
- ▶ Blood Donation Camps — Regular drives in partnership with Greater Noida's empanelled hospitals and blood banks
- ▶ Voter Awareness Programs — SVEEP campaigns encouraging civic participation during local, state and national elections
- ▶ Women's Safety Workshops — Self-defence training, legal rights awareness and gender empowerment sessions
- ▶ Joy of Giving Society Special Camp — Annual 7-day residential community service camp in an adopted village with documented outcomes

Joy of Giving Society — Community Service Initiative

IILM University's Joy of Giving Society is the university's primary community service and social outreach initiative. Rooted in the spirit of empathy and shared responsibility, this student-driven society organises year-round programmes that connect the IILM community with the people and communities around them.

- ▶ Old Clothes Donation Drives — Regular collection of gently used clothing donated to underprivileged communities in the surrounding areas of Greater Noida
- ▶ Community Service Camps — Students visit local underprivileged communities to assist with education, hygiene awareness and welfare activities
- ▶ Underprivileged School Support Programme — IILM students visit identified government and low-income schools in the region, providing mentoring, tutoring, educational material distribution and motivational sessions to school children
- ▶ Festive Giving Drives — During festivals such as Diwali, students organise food, clothing and gift distribution for underserved families
- ▶ Blood Donation Camps — Regular drives in partnership with Greater Noida hospitals and blood banks

The Joy of Giving Society is open to all students across all schools and programmes. Participation is voluntary and is formally recognised in the student's co-curricular record. Students who demonstrate outstanding commitment to community service are recognised at the Annual Social Impact Awards ceremony.

CHAPTER 11

ROLE OF PARENTS AND GUARDIANS

Partners in your ward's journey to excellence

At IILM University, we believe that the success of every student is rooted in a strong, respectful partnership between the University, the student and their parents or guardians. Your involvement plays a pivotal role in supporting your ward's academic journey, personal growth and overall well-being. Outlined below are the key roles expected of all parents and guardians. - ▶ Avoid unnecessary interference in everyday university matters; instead, empower your ward to resolve issues through proper channels.

- ▶ Familiarise yourself with the rules, policies and expectations outlined in this handbook and ensure that your ward complies with them.
- ▶ Do not attempt to bypass formal university processes or seek special treatment.
- ▶ Understand that professional boundaries are maintained by the University to uphold fairness, equity and student growth.

4. Participate in University Engagements

- ▶ Attend important University events such as orientation programmes, convocation ceremonies and parent-student meetings.
- ▶ Engage in workshops and interactive sessions that help you better understand the student experience at IILM.

5. Encourage Holistic Development

- ▶ Motivate your ward to participate in extracurricular activities, sports, clubs, community service and leadership opportunities.
- ▶ Acknowledge that personal development, emotional resilience and interpersonal skills are as vital as academic achievements.

6. Ensure Accurate and Transparent Communication

- ▶ Confirm that your contact details and personal information are correctly submitted to the University by your ward.
- ▶ Keep your phone number, email and address updated at all times to receive timely notifications and emergency communications.
- ▶ Refrain from submitting forged, misleading or incomplete documents. All information provided must be truthful and verifiable.

7. Trust the University Ecosystem

- ▶ Place confidence in the faculty, systems and student support structures at IILM University.
- ▶ Allow your ward to face and navigate challenges independently, knowing that appropriate support and guidance are always available.
- ▶ Recognise that learning to adapt, self-regulate and grow through real-life situations is a vital part of becoming a responsible adult.

ANNEXURE A — ITEMS TO BRING

The following is a suggested packing list for new students joining IILM University. Do not overpack on arrival. Most additional items can be purchased locally in Greater Noida or ordered online once you have assessed your actual needs.

Room Essentials

- ▶ Bedspreads, bed sheets and pillow cover (single-bed size)
- ▶ Padlock and duplicate key for wardrobe or personal storage
- ▶ Torch or battery-operated lamp
- ▶ A quality umbrella for the monsoon season

Personal Hygiene and Toiletries

- ▶ Soap, shampoo, conditioner, toothpaste and toothbrush
- ▶ Bucket, mug and soap case for bathroom use
- ▶ Bathroom slippers and a pair of comfortable sneakers
- ▶ Personal sanitary supplies as required
- ▶ Mosquito repellent

Academic Essentials

- ▶ Laptop — strongly recommended for all students; assignments, LMS access and digital tools require it
- ▶ Stationery: pens, pencils, notebooks, files, calculator and ruler
- ▶ A4 clear-file folder for storing important documents
- ▶ USB pen drive and portable hard disk for data backups

Health and Medical

- ▶ All personal prescription medicines with copies of prescriptions in adequate supply
- ▶ Extra pair of spectacles or contact lenses if applicable
- ▶ Water bottles (two recommended for a full campus day)

Clothing and Seasonal Items

- ▶ Sufficient everyday wear for approximately two weeks between laundry cycles
- ▶ Formal wear for presentations, viva voce and academic events
- ▶ Warm clothing for Greater Noida winters (November to February can be cold)
- ▶ Sports clothing: at least one full sports kit, shoes and tracksuit
- ▶ Raincoat or waterproof jacket for the monsoon (July to September)

Important: Refrigerators, large fans, room heaters, induction cooktops and all heavy electrical appliances are prohibited in hostel rooms. Do not bring them. They will be confiscated immediately.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: What is the Student Handbook and why should I read it?

A: The Student Handbook is your official guide to everything that defines life at IILM University, covering academic policies, campus facilities, student rights, support services and conduct expectations. Reading it carefully at the beginning of your programme will prevent confusion, help you avoid inadvertent policy violations and ensure you can access the full range of resources available to you.

Q: What is the minimum attendance requirement?

A: 75% attendance is compulsory in each course per semester. Below 75% results in debarment from the End Semester Examination for that course.

Q: How do I report a ragging incident?

A: Report to the Dean Students' Welfare (dsw@iilm.edu), your Hostel Warden, any faculty member or the national Anti-Ragging Helpline at 1800-180-5522 (24/7, toll-free). You may also file at www.antiragging.in. All reports are treated with full confidentiality.

Q: What do I do if I am facing financial difficulty?

A: Approach the Dean Students' Welfare (dsw@iilm.edu) with supporting documents. IILM offers merit-cum-means scholarships, government scholarship facilitation, fee instalment facilities and emergency financial assistance. Bring it to our attention early.

Q: How do I access mental health counseling?

A: Book via the YourDost Portal or walk in to the campus Counseling Centre during working hours. All sessions are completely confidential.

Q: What is IILM's policy on AI tools in academic work?

A: AI tools such as ChatGPT may be used only where explicitly authorised by the course instructor for a specific assignment. When permitted, the use must be disclosed in the submission. Submitting AI-generated content as your own original work is treated as plagiarism.

Q: How does the three-tier sports structure work?

A: TIER 1 is the House Cup: every student competes for their House across multiple sports throughout the year. TIER 2 is INVICTUS: the inter-school tournament across all six IILM schools, held in January. TIER 3 is BLAZE: the grand inter-university sports festival drawing 12+ universities to the IILM campus.

Q: Can I change my programme or school?

A: Applications are accepted at the end of the first semester, subject to seat availability, eligibility and academic performance.

Q: What are the hostel rules about electrical appliances?

A: Refrigerators, room heaters, induction cooktops, air coolers and immersion rods are prohibited and will be confiscated immediately.

Q: How do I file a complaint about my grade or an exam irregularity?

A: First speak directly with the faculty member concerned. If unresolved within 7 working days, submit a formal grievance to the SGRC. The SGRC acknowledges your complaint within 48 hours and investigates the matter.

Q: What is the process for a hostel room change?

A: Submit a written application to your Hostel Warden stating the reason. Room changes are subject to availability and require written approval from the Warden and Deputy Dean Students' Welfare. Informal room swaps without approval are not permitted.

Q: Who do I contact if I experience sexual harassment?

A: Contact the ICC Chairperson at icc.gn@iilm.edu or submit a written complaint marked 'Confidential — ICC' to the Dean Students' Welfare's office. Complete confidentiality is guaranteed.

Q: Where can I find all university policies?

A: All policies are available at www.iilm.edu/greater-noida. A curated list with direct links is in Annexure B of this handbook. Physical copies are at the Dean Students' Welfare's office.

Q: What should I do in a medical emergency on campus?

A: Contact your Hostel Warden or Campus Security immediately; both are available 24/7. Campus Security can call an ambulance and reach the on-call doctor. For national emergencies, dial 108 for an ambulance.
